M.A. DEGREE PROGRAM

A Master's degree in languages is a personally enriching way of working toward career goals, whether you're interested in teaching, marketing, management, public service, translation/interpreting, or any other field that benefits from a nuanced understanding of other cultures and languages. Completing your degree involves perfecting your ability to speak the target language, allowing you to communicate more readily with individuals from throughout the world, but also to have an in-depth knowledge of other cultures and how they influence and are influenced by interactions with others.

Students completing an M.A. in Foreign Languages at MSU will emerge from the program having taken coursework on literature, culture, and film in their target language. They will have the confidence to engage with native speakers of the target language, know of their history, cultural production, and cultural practices, and be ready to integrate that knowledge into a wide variety of professions. In many cases, they will have the opportunity to complete their education through international travel, and also have the ability to teach the target language to other students.

The program has a strong placement record, with graduates going on to competitive Ph.D. programs throughout the U.S., being placed into teaching jobs regionally, and working locally and internationally in business and language pedagogy. The department strives to support students fully, with full tuition remissions for qualifying Teaching Assistants for the duration of their graduate careers at MSU.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS:

- \$60 application fee (\$80 for international students)
- Statement of purpose
- Three letters of recommendation
- Official transcript showing BA degree and any additional coursework
- TOEFL score (International students only)

(CMLL does NOT require GRE scores.)

Ask a peer to read over your Statement or Resume.


TEACHING ASSISTANTSHIPS:
